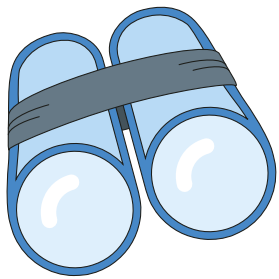


# WILD-LIFE ACTIVITY SHEET

## BRETT'S GUIDE TO MAKING RECYCLED BINOCULARS

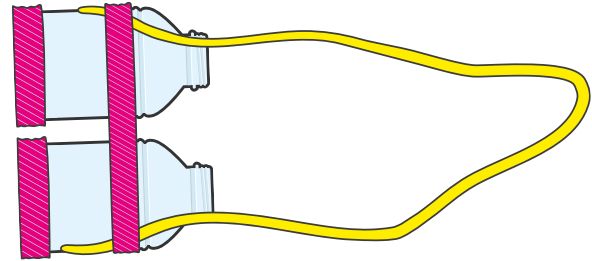


Badgers can't see very well, which is why Brett has made himself some binoculars. All the better to spot worms, fruit and berries which he likes to eat! Why not make yourself some binoculars ready for your next adventure?



### What you'll need

- 2 plastic bottles
- Patterned wrapping tape or sticky tape
- Scissors
- Piece of leftover ribbon or string



### What to do

- 1 Take the labels and lids off the plastic bottles.
- 2 Ask a grown-up to help you cut the end off the bottom of the bottle.
- 3 Use short lengths of tape folding halfway over the edge all around to cover the jagged edge where you've just cut.
- 4 Use the patterned tape to join the two bottles together securely.
- 5 Fix one end of a piece of ribbon to the side of one of the bottles with some more tape. Make a loop long enough to go around your neck holding the binoculars, and tape the other end of the ribbon to the other side of the other bottle.
- 6 See what you can see through your new recycled binoculars!



## WILD-LIFE FACT

Did you know? You'll often find badgers in woodland next to grassy fields where animals are grazing. A badger's home is called a sett. If you see a hole that is in the shape of a 'U' like this on its side you might have found one!
